Beach Nourishment 2022

Beach renourishment will be occurring this summer, bringing you More Beach to Love. Approximately 1.6 miles of shoreline from the Army Corps Pier north to Skimmer Way will have sand added as part of the Town's shoreline management plan. This project is designed to replace expected loss of sand from the 2017 nourishment and continue to provide important protection from storms, supporting a more resilient beach. Maintenance in this area is expected approximately every five years.

Work in Duck is tentatively scheduled for mid-September, with equipment staging estimated to begin in August. During equipment staging, contractors will begin placing pipeline and equipment near or on the beach. This timeline was presented by dredging contractor Weeks Marine and is subject to change based on weather and other factors.

During the construction phase of the nourishment, sand is collected in a dredge from an off-shore borrow area. The sand is then pumped onto the beach and moved by equipment to the proper area. Active construction zones are relatively short and should move quickly. For the short time construction is in an area, marked paths around the area are provided to reach the beach. The pipeline that carries the sand from the dredge to the beach may be in place for longer, and sand ramps will be placed over the pipeline for pedestrians.

PROJECTED 2022 BEACH NOURISHMENT SCHEDULE

WHERE:

Approximately 1.6 miles of shoreline from the Army Corps Pier north to Skimmer Way

WHEN*:

Estimated Equipment Staging— August

Estimated Construction Start Date—Mid-September

Estimated Duration—20-30 days

*Dates are tentative and subject to change due to a number of factors, including weather. Updates will be placed on our website as we receive them.

Beach Furniture Reminders

Help keep the beach enjoyable and safe for all this summer by following the proper rules for beach furniture: tents, chairs, umbrellas, beach toys, etc.

- Items must not be placed on the beach before 8:00 a.m. unless in use.
- ◆ All items must be removed by 5:00 p.m. if not in use. If staying later than 5:00 p.m., remove all items entirely from the beach when you leave. Nothing should be left on the beach, dunes, or stairs overnight.
- ◆ Items that are left unattended before 8:00 a.m. or after 5:00 p.m. may be removed and disposed of as litter.
- Tents, chairs, or other beach items must allow a 15' travel lane at the base of the dunes and around lifeguard stands for emergency access.
- Tents may not be larger than 12'x12' or taller than 9'.
- Tents, cabanas, or sunshades must be spaced 10' apart and must not be tied together.



Hurricane season is June 1 through November 30. Now is a great time to review your hurricane plan, including evacuation, communication, and insurances.

These rules allow for people and wildlife to safely share the beach and allow emergency personnel room to work.

It is important to know the hazards that may exist for your property and what steps you can take to prepare your property to reduce the risks of flood damages. Flooding can occur during storm events such as hurricanes or simply from heavy rainfall and poor drainage of soil conditions. Floods can happen any time, anywhere.

- Trash: Monday & Friday May 1 to September 30
 Mondays only October to April 30
- **Recycling**: Mondays May 1 to October 31 First and third Mondays November 1 to April 30
- ⇒ Place your can at the street no earlier than the day before collection, and roll back on the day of collection
- Spring Bulk Waste: April 22, 2022
- Fall Bulk Waste: October 14, 2022



Knox-Box

The KNOX-BOX® Rapid Entry System is a small, wall-mounted safe containing entry keys. This allows firefighters access to your unoccupied residence or commercial building during an emergency or fire alarm activation without forced entry. The box reduces response time, property damage, and liability for lost keys.

Reflective Signage

Reflective address signs placed near the road can help emergency services find your house more quickly during an emergency. Signs can be self-installed or installed by the Fire Department.
